# Policy on Calendar and Scheduling

## I. PURPOSE

An important component of managing the curriculum is planning and monitoring the scheduling and implementation of classroom-based courses. The Curriculum Committee is responsible for overseeing the arrangement of the curriculum, and establishing limits on student workload. The school must monitor student workload to assure that there is adequate time for independent studying and preparation for in-class activities.

#### **II. SCOPE**

This policy applies to:

- Course and clerkship directors
- Associate Dean for Medical Education

#### **III. POLICY**

The Associate Dean for Medical Education will review and approve the overall curriculum calendar and the schedules for individual courses and clerkships. The Curriculum Committee will review and approve any significant changes to the calendar. Significant changes are those that will alter the number of weeks of the medical education program or that have the potential to affect students' ability to meet curriculum requirements. The Curriculum Committee will review and approve any changes to the sequence of courses.

During the Foundations curriculum, the maximum number of scheduled hours of required synchronous coursework is 24 hours per week. Exceptions to this limit will be reviewed and approved by the Associate Dean for Medical Education.

During the Clerkships and Bridges phase of the curriculum, the maximum number of scheduled hours for clinical courses are as stated in the Duty Hours policy. For nonclinical courses, the maximum number of scheduled hours is 32 hours per week. Exceptions to this limit will be reviewed and approved by the Associate Dean for Medical Education.
